Dear TRICARE Beneficiary,

I am writing to inform you of recent changes to the Department of Defense (DoD) TRICARE Pharmacy Program Uniform formulary. On February 2, 2009, the Director, TRICARE Management Activity approved recommendations from the DoD Pharmacy & Therapeutics (P&T) Committee for the Short-Acting Beta Agonists (Bronchodilator) drug class. The DoD P&T Committee selected the most clinically effective and cost effective medications for inclusion on the Uniform formulary (Tier 1 & Tier 2) and designated other products as non-formulary (Tier 3).

Your medication history indicates that you are or have used at least one of the non-formulary medications recently. I encourage you to talk to your health care provider about using one of the formulary medications listed in the table on the enclosed page titled "List of Formulary Alternatives for Non-formulary Medications". Non-formulary medications remain available to beneficiaries, except for Active Duty, at a higher co-pay of \$22. TRICARE does not cover non-formulary medications for Active duty service members.
